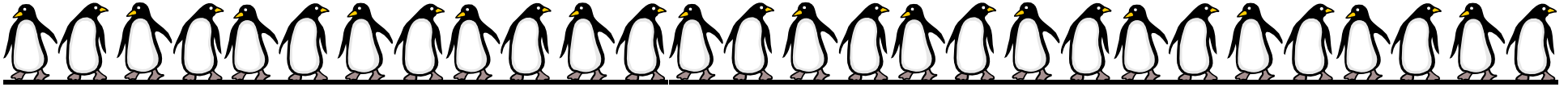

Dear Families,

Our staff works hard to make sure students are learning everyday and feel safe at school. We appreciate all of your support with the learning process (helping with homework, volunteering at school and with the PTO, etc.) Our 3rd through 5th grade students worked hard on their MEAP tests and I know they all did their personal best.

### Summer Learning Program

We enjoyed our Summer Learning Medal Awards assembly. So many children, with support of their families earned bronze, silver or gold medals for the work they did this summer to reduce “brain drain”. We thank you for encouraging them to read, write and compute a little this summer. We thank the many volunteers and teachers that helped work with kids each week on the playground and apartment complexes. We extend a very special thanks to Helen Starman for organizing this great program for our school.

### Community Circles Begin

We began our Community Circles on October 22 with a slideshow presentation by Ms. Erdstein. Ms. Erdstein visited a couple of the communities in Honduras that benefit from Heifer International this summer. During March is Reading Month last year our students read books to earn money to send to Heifer International who sponsor gifts of livestock to families in underdeveloped countries. Thanks Ms.

Erdstein for the great slideshow and information. We all enjoyed seeing our reading dollars do so much for others.

Our Latino families enjoyed meeting each other, their children’s teachers, the PTO officers, and the volunteers from PALMA and The Family Learning Institute. We all had a wonderful evening of good food and good company.

### Learning Math Facts the EDM way

Every Day Math is an inquiry based mathematics program. Inquiry based means that teachers encourage students to explore avenues for solving problems. The teachers act as coaches and facilitators to ensure our student’s investigations are on track. As a class, teachers and students discuss all of the ways students found the answers including ways that didn’t work and why. Through this exploration and discussion students develop a deep understanding of the mathematics they are studying. This same approach is used to help students understand the patterns found in addition, subtraction and multiplication facts. Most students catch on to these patterns quickly and make effective use of them to help them memorize their facts.

Children who don’t easily see the connections between numbers have difficulty memorizing basic

addition, subtraction, and multiplication facts. They see a stack of flashcards and get overwhelmed, thinking there are “hundreds” of isolated facts to memorize. We know that it is much easier to memorize these facts when students see these relationships and use them as strategies for remembering them. Teachers provide very deliberate instruction and experiences to help students learn to see these relationships and use them as strategies for learning. I’ve listed them here so that you can help your children think about these strategies as you help them study their facts. If students use these strategies it will raise their confidence that this task really IS within their reach.

- ◆ Any time 0 is added to a number, the sum is that number
- ◆ Any time 1 is added to a number, it is the next counting number
- ◆ Any time 2 is added to a number, it is like “skip” counting
- ◆ Combinations whose sums are 10 (0+10, 1+9, 2+8, 3+7, 4+6, 5+5, 6+4, 7+3, 8+2, 9+1, 10+0)
- ◆ Doubles to 10 + 10: (2+2, 3+3, 4+4, 5+5, 6+6, 7+7, 8+8, 9+9), typically pretty easy for kids to learn, but important because...
- ◆ If they know doubles, they can solve “doubles plus or minus 1,” for example 5+6, 7+8
- ◆ Making 10: to solve 9+7, think 10+6
- ◆ Using other facts they know to solve unknown facts; for instance, if they know 7+8=15, then 6+8 must be 14.

## ... more from our Principal

- ◆ Any time 0 is subtracted from a number, the answer is that number
- ◆ Any time you subtract a number from itself (8-8) the answer is 0
- ◆ Any time 1 is subtracted from a number, it is the number before it
- ◆ Doubles help for subtraction like they help with addition.
- ◆ Think addition: It is often helpful to “think addition” for example, for  $12-9$ , think  $9+?$  = 12 (nine plus what makes twelve?)

One way to help your child at home is by working on memorizing the facts that follow one of these patterns, helping them master facts related to one strategy before moving onto the next pattern. Start with the easier patterns and ask them to explain the strategy they are using to remember the fact. We want to move students away from counting on their fingers, which is not a strategy that promotes the development of mathematical thinking.

There are more of these strategies that help students remember their multiplication facts. Please don't hesitate to ask your child's teacher for these strategies.

We are piloting a computer program that helps students memorize their multiplication facts as it visually highlights these strategies and relationships. The program is called Timez Attack. Twenty-five of our 4th and 5th graders will participate in the pilot. If it proves to be a helpful tool we will consider purchasing a school-wide license.

## Art Room News

It's good to be back and to start on another exciting year in the art classroom. We quickly created art portfolios for our artwork and made artwork to display on the front of them: self-portraits for 1st grade, torn paper collage animals for second, crayon batik designs for 3rd, and symmetrical cut-outs for 4th.

**5th graders** designed Matisse cut-out designs for their portfolio covers. They are now studying "Día de los Muertos" (Day of the Dead), a Mexican holiday celebrating ancestors and loved ones who have died. Expect to see dancing skeletons (Calaveras), papel picado (cut-out paper designs for decorations) and retablas (miniature boxes with scenes of Calaveras).

### News Flash

**I also would like to make an all-call for 5th grade parent help during clay house making time.** For families new to Burns Park, 5th graders traditionally do large-scale slab buildings to make a piece of architecture in clay. Students come as early as 8:20 am and work until they're done-usually about 11:00. A project of this scale could not happen without parent volunteers. No experience necessary. This time is tentatively scheduled for these Tuesday mornings (8:30-11:00 or any part of that time): Nov. 18 (Pryce), Nov. 25 (Kreger) and Dec. 4 (Cramer).

The **4th graders** created cut paper symmetrical designs inspired by their geometry math unit this year. We're now studying Impressionism and have had a "plein air" session outdoors sketching landscapes around Burns Park. Paintings are forthcoming.

**3rd graders** are creating puppets from papier mache and sawdust. They are now working on the costumes and personalities of these creations. Coiled pots made from clay should be coming home soon.

**2nd graders** have been painting landscapes and working with clay making frames. Ask your 2nd grader how many shades of green they mixed in art class.

**1st graders** have completed their Kandinsky paintings that they created to music. They will dazzle the hallways with color over the next few weeks. Magic doors will be coming home soon and now: on to Vincent Van Gogh! Their interpretations of "Starry Night" and "Sunflowers" will soon adorn the walls.

Finally, **Kindergarteners** have been introduced to the Line Family (so important in drawing and making letters) and are finishing up their bear collages. We will move to color mixing and clay pumpkins will be home by Halloween.
